Ministries, Bengaluru. Rev Raj spoke on Breathing Together in Solidarity.







JOHN DAYAL RETURNS TO EDITORS GUILD EXECUTIVE



I had to fin d my sunshine in everyday things. I began to navigate my way through the lockdown and I experienced a certain peace within me as I found more time to be in the presence of the Lord. I started feeling rejuvenated.

The negative coverage by the media seemed to affect me less and lesser with each passing day. I started spending time with my family more than ever. I had a new refreshing routine in place that started with personal prayer and ended with gratitude.

I saw the book of Ecclesiastes 2:22 coming true where the author says, "For what does a man get for all the toil and striving with which he labours under the sun? Indeed, all his days are filled with grief, and his task is sorrowful; even at night, his mind does not rest."

Here God was allowing me to enjoy the fruit of my labour and unlimited

compulsory rest which I forfeited being on the go. It was time to reflect and prune off what did not matter both mentally and spiritually and make some serious changes. I found time to be able to learn new hymns, start journaling, prepare for sessions for confirmation students and of course pursue my hobbies too.

When certain relaxations were made to the lockdown, I was invited to resume singing for Mass recordings that were being streamed online. I felt like a spring in my step as I looked forward to singing every weekend for Mass and to be able to receive Jesus once again.

uring an online morning prayer service on 16 November, Bishop Arnold Temple, chairperson of the World Council of Churches Ecumenical Water Network and the president of All Africa Conference of Churches, reflected on World Toilet Day, which will be observed this year

on 19 November.



The Jeypore Evangelical Lutheran Church in India, National Council of Churches in India, and World Council of Churches will participate in a webinar on November 19 to discuss sanitation for all, and its linkages to climate change, stigma

and taboo related to casteism in India.

"We are reflecting here on a subject that we do not usually want to discuss: toilets," said Bishop Temple. "Somebody may have defecated upstream, and that same water is collected by people who live downstream, and they are open to diseases such as diarrhoea, cholera, etc," "Most people take sanitation—and particularly toilets—for granted," said Temple. "You know, my friends, the movement of our bowels is a natural phenomenon."■

'The President-elect expressed his desire to work together on the basis of a shared belief in the dignity and equality of all humankind on issues such as caring for the marginalized and the poor, addressing the crisis of climate change, and welcoming and



integrating immigrants and refugees into our communities."

When he is inaugurated, Biden will

be the second Catholic president of the United States. John F Kennedy was elected November 8, 1960. ■

ROLE OF CHURCHES DURING "PROFOUND ECONOMIC AND **SOCIETAL CRISIS**"

uring a World Council of Churches (WCC) executive committee meeting, WCC moderator Dr Agnes Abuom and WCC interim general secretary Rev. Prof. Dr Ioan Sauca shared highlights on the WCC's role in a world facing great challenges.

Abuom noted that the world was still in a big fight against COVID-19. "It has abruptly disrupted the momentum towards achievement of the development agenda, having triggered the most profound economic and societal crisis the world has seen for the last century," she said. WCC publishes "Global Health COVID-19 Response Framework"

After on going consultations between church and healthcare leaders from many countries. the World Council of Churches has published an "Ecumenical Global Health COVID-19 Response Framework."

The framework, which is the product of collaboration by more than 40 organizations, provides practical ways to translate the church's prophetic voice into action in ways that demonstrate love and compassion.

"Unprecedented challenge for churches worldwide"

The leadership of the Joint Working Group between the Roman Catholic Church and the World Council of Churches (WCC), during an online meeting released a communique acknowledging the current unprecedented challenges and mapping the work ahead.

The Group acknowledged that the anti-COVID-19 measures had created an unprecedented challenge for churches worldwide, limiting the access of the faithful to pastoral care and restraining ecumenical contacts," the communique reads. "At the same time, the crisis had necessitated the use of modern technologies, with churches developing new and enduring forms of pastoral ministry and ecumenical life."

'COVID-19 AS AN OPPORTUNITY FOR CHANGE'

020 remains an incredibly tough year for the YMCA Movement and above all for the young people it serves. "But YMCAs the world over are confronting

their new Covid reality, and seeing it as an opportunity for change," says Carol Sanvee, Secretary General, V YMCA.

With the Solidarity YMCA clubbed together to tide over a difficult period, and with the 'Padare' process, it is planning towards the next steps of 'Reimagination', and 'Reset'. And through the Youth-Led Solutions Initiative, the young people will show the way.

Resilience, recovery and reimagination - the three pillars of the World YMCA response to the Covid-19

pandemic in 2020 - were the themes running through the agenda at the 80th Executive Meeting ended on 31st October.

"Five years ago, none of

us could have imagined that our 2020 would be anything like this", said World **YMCA** President Patricia Pelton, 'The Covid pandemic of 2020 means that we have to bring our horizons

nearer to us. While definitely a huge challenge, we should see it as an accelerator of change, and opportunity for change."

The Committee also discussed the Secretary-General's written report on the year to date, and his spoken address highlighting priorities and directions for the year to come.
