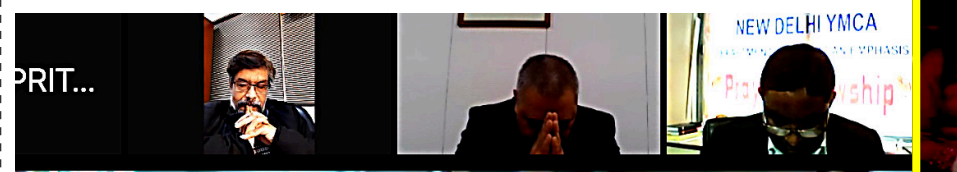

RAY OF HOPE FOR NDY EDUCATION DEPARTMENT

Delhi Government's latest order has sparked a ray of hope. Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia has allowed reopening of schools for students of classes 10 and 12. In all probability all other institutions will also be reopened soon. It will help New Delhi YMCA start physical classes in various courses. Like the students of classes 10 and 12, students in professional courses also need to appear for exams and obtain diplomas for entering in the job market.

Even as physical classes are not on, Directors and Faculty at New Delhi YMCA are running regular online classes. Even new admissions are in full swing. And they have managed to enroll a fairly good number of students. In mid-January alone they enrolled 64 students for various courses. NDY is



also conducting counselling sessions at various top schools in the city. The results of the new initiative are very encouraging. On the play field also NDY is getting back to normalcy. Every evening top volleyball players in the Capital come to NDY for their daily training sessions. Same is the case with other sport. ■

VATICAN ISSUES GUIDELINES FOR ASH WEDNESDAY



The Vatican on January 12 gave guidance about how priests can distribute ashes on Ash Wednesday amid the coronavirus pandemic.

The Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments published a note directing priests to say the formula for distributing the ashes once to everyone present, rather than to each person.

The priest "addresses all those pres-

ent and only once says the formula as it appears in the Roman Missal, applying it to all in general: 'Repent, and believe in the Gospel,' or 'Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return,'"

the note said. It continued: "The priest then cleanses his hands, puts on a face mask and distributes the ashes to those who come to him or, if appropriate, he goes to those who

are standing in their places.

The priest takes the ashes and sprinkles them on the head of each one without saying anything."

The note was signed by the congregation's prefect, Cardinal Robert Sarah, and its secretary, Archbishop Arthur Roche. Ash Wednesday falls on February 17 this year.

In 2020, the divine worship congregation put out various instructions for

POPE OPENS DOORS TO WOMEN AT THE ALTAR

Pope Francis has said that from now on the ministries of Lector and Acolyte are to be open to women, in a stable and institutionalized form through a specific mandate.

There is nothing new about women proclaiming the Word of God during liturgical celebrations or carrying out a service at the altar as altar servers or as Eucharistic ministers.

In many communities throughout the world these practices are already authorized by local bishops.

However, up to this point, this has occurred without a true and proper institutional mandate, as an exception to what Pope St Paul VI had established when, in 1972, even while abolishing the so-called "minor orders", he decided to maintain that access to these ministries be granted only to men because they were considered to be preparatory to the eventual admission to holy orders.

Now, in the wake of the discernment which has emerged from the last Synods of Bishops, Pope Francis wanted to formalize and institutionalize the presence of women at the altar.

With the Motu proprio Spiritus Domini, which modifies the first paragraph of Canon 230 of the Code of Canon Law, Pope Francis, therefore, establishes that women can have access to these ministries and that they be recognized through a liturgical act formally instituting them as such. ■

priests on administering the sacraments and offering Mass during the coronavirus pandemic, including for the celebration of Easter, which occurred when many countries were in lockdown and public liturgies were not permitted. ■

development curriculum created to empower young volunteers and staff from YMCAs across the world, to be change makers in their own communities.

Consisting of online and face-to-face training, local mentoring, and local project development, Change Agents gain skills designed to help transform their YMCA and community, as well as building connections to an international network of other young leaders.

Since 2014, three cohorts, totalling 750 Change Agents, have

graduated and now lead change in 67 countries around the world. ■
