Now we will be able to start functioning our Education Department. Swimming pool is already set to open. Both are major source of revenue for NDY.

Within a span of five days the Association acquired a beautiful property, Dorothy Villa, in Mahargaon and also got 24 room hospitality facility earlier known as Country Inn, on a five-year lease in Saatal. All this happened in less than a week. The Country Inn will now be known as YMCA extension of Campsite.

The Trustees, President Jovial Vaghela, Board and the a three-member committee constituted to oversee the transactions were on the same page which made General Secretary Mark Clive and his team to finish the administrative work in a record time.

The Dorothy Villa, a well-furnished and running property was jointly owned by 92-year-old Miss Lillian Wallace and her colleague and friend, well over 80, Miss Eileen Richards. A day before the transaction Miss Wallace had taken ill



and was rushed to hospital while Miss Richards is already bed-ridden. Both were concerned about the property. "But now I am relieved after handing it over to New Delhi YMCA," reacted Miss Wallace after signing the papers. Miss Richards

expressed a similar sentiment when the Registrar Nainital asked her if she had any reservation on the deal. "Not at all," a beaming Miss Richards told the Regis-





trar from her bed.

Incidentally the Registrar and his staff came to Dorothy Villa to get their signatures on the deal as the two old ladies were not in a position to travel to the Court in Nainital. At the court, however, the General

Secretary Mark Clive and his team spent the entire day getting formalities completed. "But it was worth all the trouble," a relieved Mark Clive said.



# UN ADOPTS RESOLUTION ON PROTECTING RELIGIOUS SITES

The UN General Assembly adopted a resolution on January 21 calling for greater efforts to protect religious sites from acts of terrorism and asking for a global conference on the subject.

Titled "Promoting a culture of peace and tolerance to safeguard religious sites," the resolution asks Secretary

General Antonio Guterres to launch an international conference to discuss the best means of implementing the United Nations Plan of Action to Safeguard Religious Sites.

"Religious sites are representative of the history, social fabric and traditions of people in every country and community all over the world and should be fully respected as such," the resolution says.

The resolution highlights the increasing threats to culturally and spiritually significant sites by terrorists and militias, who have at times destroyed religious property and illicitly trafficked artifacts.

The resolution denounces "all attacks on and in religious places, sites and shrines, including any deliberate de-

struction of relics and monuments" and condemns "all acts or threats of violence, destruction, damage or endangerment, directed against religious sites as such, that continue to occur in the world, and denounces any moves to obliterate or forcibly convert any religious sites."

It calls on the governments to promote

these religious sites as vulnerable targets and to implement safeguards to protect them. The resolution states that governments should assess risks and potential targets as well as "ensure that comprehensive measures are in place for the immediate response to an attack."

The resolution also challenges the United Nations to develop "strategies, educational initiatives, and global communications campaigns and tools" that foster greater multicultural respect and media awareness.

Saudi Arabia proposed the resolution, which was co-sponsored by Arab nations including Egypt, Iraq, the UAE, Yemen, Sudan, and Palestine. The resolution was also supported by the United States and the European Union.

## SCOTLAND YMCA TRAINING KIDS TO BECOME DIGITAL EXPERTS

The Paisley YMCA in Scotland is training young kids to become digital experts. Since 2015, they have launched six youth digital clubs to equip kids and teenagers with creative, computing and design skills.

Around 120 young people between age 8 and 18 are registered to the Paisley YMCA youth clubs. "We realised that the traditional education does not fully reflect what the future of work is", says Darran Gillan, Youth & Programme Development Manager. "This is why we focus on digital education. There is a clear need for young people to master the new technologies."

Chimdindu, 9 years old, had no idea about what coding was: "It is my dad who got me registered. And now, I love it. I am coding, drawing and writing storyboards. It is quite complicated but fun. I am learning a lot and I have lots of friends there".

Charley, 11 years old, agrees: "This is definitely more fun than at school! I think that all this digital learning is important for my future. Most of the jobs will be related to computers".

Paisley YMCA also has a STEM Girls club, for young women to embrace Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics. "We know this is a sector usually dominated by men. We offer this space for



girls to come together, experiment, discover new potential, and support each other. This is our most popular youth group" explains Darran Gillan.

Since 2020, due to the pandemic, all these clubs are now held online. "We had to work creatively to ensure digital inclusion", shares Claire McGinley, Youth and Programme Coordinator. "Many young people do not have their own computer, or do not have unlimited internet access. We collected and donated £22,000 worth of materials from various foundations and government programmes.

# 1,500-YEAR-OLD 'CHRIST, BORN OF MARY' INSCRIPTION DISCOVERED IN ISRAEL

rchaeologists have unearthed a 1,500-year-old inscribed Christian blessing that begins, "Christ, born of Mary," the Israel Antiquities Authority (IAA) has reported.

The stone inscription, written in

Greek, was once part of a lintel (the structure that spans the top of door frames) that decorated the entrance of a church, located in what is now et-Taiyiba (also called Taiba), a village in Israel's northern Jezreel Valley.

The church itself dates to the late fifth century A.D., meaning it may have been built during the Byzantine Empire. In addition to the lintel, archaeologists found that the previously unknown church contained mosaic pavements arranged in a geometric design.

The inscription was likely created for the church's opening dedication, according to Leah Di-Segni, a researcher at the Institute of Archaeology of the Hebrew University of Jerusalem, who translated the text. In full, the inscription reads, "Christ born of Mary. This work of the most God-fearing and pious bishop [Theodo]sius and the miserable Th[omas] was built from the founda-

tion - -. Whoever enters should pray for them."

The opening line, "Christ

born of Mary,"
was likely intended to protect the reader of the inscription from evil forces — it's a

common phrase used in inscriptions and documents from that time, Di-Segni said.

Theodosius, one of the men referenced in the inscription, was one of the first Christian bishops and the building's founder. Theodosius was a regional archbishop, meaning he had religious authority over the larger metropolis of Bet She'an, which included what is now et-Taiyiba.

# 'ANDHRA'S ANGLICAN SCHOOLS ARE DYING'

everal Anglican schools in Andhra
Pradesh, which did decades long yeoman service in taking free education to
the most oppressed sections of the society,
have shut down over the years.

According to media reports, even as these schools shut down one after the other, there was gross inaction and negligence from successive governments of the day and officials who let them suffer a silent death.

Anglican schools have closed down in Kalla, Doddanapudi and Yelurupadu in West Godavari district and Takkellapadu village in Krishna district.

Some educational institutions linked to the Anglican church include St. Stephen's College in Delhi, Bishop Cotton Boys and Girls Schools (Bengaluru), The Cathedral and John Connon School (Mumbai) and many others where children from the most elite families in India have obtained education and continue to do so.

A large number of serving and retired bureaucrats went to St. Stephen's College, including the newly appointed Telangana High Court Chief Justice Hima Kohli.

However, in stark contrast, when these schools and colleges continue to thrive, their sister organisations or schools located in rural places and poor neighbourhoods in Andhra Pradesh are reportedly dying.
